Benson Village School GO BEARS!

January will be a busy month for the BVS Bears! Along with academic opportunities to showcase strategies students have been working on in both reading and math, there are so many additional ways that our students work towards developing their critical thinking, perseverance, and growth towards proficiency with their grade level skills. Project-based learning and STEAM projects engage our learners and allow for analytical and creative problem-solving to take place. The many clubs offered after school; American Sign Language Club, Beading & Crafting Club, Girls Scouts, Boys & Girls Club, offer students a chance to try something new. During the school day we have many visitors like Milo the therapy dog, Sadie Koponen, Outdoor Therapeutic Recreation Specialist for the Slate Valley School District and Sandra Owens, Funology Instructor. The upper grades are participating in both the Trout in the Classroom and Scat & Track programs offered through the Vermont Fish & Wildlife Department. The kindergarten - 2nd grades will be visiting the Castleton Library as part of their Slate Valley Community Engagement study while the 3rd grade is working on integrated writing connected to their project based learning with support from Mrs. Kristen Whitman, SVUVT Teacher Coach.

The BVS Daisy and Girl Scout Troops meet every Tuesday and continue to focus on community outreach and earning various badges. Cookie sales are starting up and the girls are learning how to talk about the cookies and take orders. They will be working on money management, and customer service badges next. The BVS Troop consists of 18 girls from both Benson and other towns.

Benson Village School continues to award both students and staff with PAWs certificates for demonstrating the positive character traits associated with our district wide PBIS (https://www.pbis.org/). To date, 279 certificates have been written for students and staff.

The SVUVT budget work is well under way and a reminder that there is one budget for the entire district, not individual school budgets. You may obtain a copy of the Annual Report report that will be available in early February on the Slate Valley website, BVS or town clerk's office. Additionally flyers will be distributed to residents' homes throughout the months of January/February with important budget information. With grocery prices rising every day, many people are struggling to eat healthy, nutritious meals on a regular basis. Did you know every Vermonter over the age of 60 is qualified to receive a box of food staples through the Vermont Foodbank? The 'Bird Boxes' are available for pickup once a month in Fair Haven at Fair Haven Concerned which is located on Main Street. Jeffrey or Michele, the directors at Fair Haven Concerned, can sign you up in just a few moments! **There are no income requirements.** This is very helpful for folks to supplement their food budget. The boxes may contain a bag of flour, some beans, rice, perhaps some cheese or meat, and a number of canned vegetables and fruit. If, when you arrive, there are some food items you are not interested in using, you may choose to not take everything. While you pick up your box each month, please consider looking through the Fair Haven Concerned's food shelves as well. There is a variety of fresh vegetables arriving weekly, as well as dairy products. The shelves are usually full and offer an assortment of fresh baked breads, food staples and frozen meats.

Fair Haven Concerned food shelf and thrift store hours are 10-2 Monday through Friday and 9-4 Monday through Friday for appointments and referrals for heat assistance. Call and sign up for the 'Bird Boxes' or stop in and find some food to supplement your food shopping. The food shelf receives delivery from the Vermont Foodbank on a regular basis. There are even some prepared meals ready to go! All food is free and available. It is a great way to stretch your budget!!! All residents of Benson are more than welcome at Fair Haven Concerned. Stop in today!!




High Speed Internet Update

The Otter Creek Communications Union District is in the final phases of negotiations to bring high speed internet to Benson. The service will, most likely be provided by Consolidated Communications/Fidium Fiber. It looks like internet speeds up to 2 gigabytes per second will be available to Benson residents. We believe that there is enough funding from the State and Federal government to pay the cost of the new service. The Selectboard has reviewed rates proposed by Consolidated Communications and Maple Broadband, as well as current rates from Go Net Speed (Otelco). Internet service provided by Consolidated Communications/Fidium Fiber is the most cost-efficient option for Benson residents.

An excel file from FCC showing the internet speeds for each address in town was made available to everyone on the new Benson web site (<u>www.bensonvermont.gov</u>).

A big Thank You to the over 50 people who responded reporting internet speed at their house. We hope that your responses will help us obtain more funding to bring high speed internet to Benson within the next two years.



Selectboard Highlights

The Selectboard is preparing the budget for fiscal year 2023 to 2024 (July 1, 2023, to June 30, 2024). While many budget costs can be estimated accurately using historic numbers, estimating prices of diesel fuel, fuel oil, and trucking, up to a year and a half ahead is challenging. The budget will be completed in late January and will be voted on at Town Meeting on Tuesday, March 7, 2023 at 10:00AM at the Community Hall.

The 2005 John Deere grader and 2013 International dump truck purchased at auction from the State of Vermont are both in use. The purchases were paid for out of the Equipment Reserve Fund. While some people criticize the idea of setting money aside for equipment purchases each year, having the money in the reserve fund enabled the Selectboard to act quickly when the grader and the truck listed at auction. We would not have been able to purchase the grader and truck if we had not had the Equipment Reserve Fund.

The Board appointed Jared Glover as our representative to the Rutland Emergency Management Committee.

The Selectboard continues to update policies and job descriptions.

The Great Alone by Kristin Hannah. In 1974, when thirteen-year-old Leni Albright's volatile, unpredictable father, Ernst, a former POW, loses another job, he makes an impulsive, desperate decision: he will move the family north, to Alaska, where they will live off the land in a spectacular wilderness. At first, the eighteen-hour sunlit Alaskan summer days and the generosity of the locals make up for the family's lack of preparation and dwindling resources, but winter in Alaska will reveal their every weakness. As the vast Alaskan landscape grows smaller and smaller in the darkness, Ernst's fragile mental state deteriorates, and the dangers outside of their remote homestead pale in comparison to the danger within. On their small piece of land, miles from anyone, Leni and her mother, Cora, learn what all Alaskan homesteaders learn: they are on their own. There is no one to save them this far from civilization.

March 15, 2023

The Mystery of Mrs. Christie by Marie Benedict. In December 1926, Agatha Christie goes missing. Investigators find her empty car on the edge of a deep, gloomy pond, the only clues some tire tracks nearby and a fur coat left in the car — strange for a frigid night. Her husband and daughter have no knowledge of her whereabouts, and England unleashes an unprecedented manhunt to find the up-and-coming mystery author. Eleven days later, she reappears, just as mysteriously as she disappeared, claiming amnesia and providing no explanations for her time away. The puzzle of those missing eleven days has persisted.

Käsknödel (Austrian Cheese Dumpling)



Makes 3 Servings

These cheesy dumplings served in hot broth are a traditional recipe from Austria and are a great way to warm up at the end of a cold day. While some of the original ingredients aren't found here, this is a converted recipe that uses easy to find ingredients.

Ingredients:

Dumplings

- 1 medium onion
- 1 tablespoon butter
- 3 cups of bread chopped (or ripped) into small pieces or packaged bread for stuffing
- 1/2 cup breadcrumbs
- 2 cups of shredded cheddar
- 3 eggs
- 1/2 cup flour
- 1/4 cup milk
- 1/8 teaspoon paprika
- 1/8 teaspoon garlic powder
- Salt and pepper to taste

Soup

32oz of broth (you can use any kind you prefer)

2 cups of water

1/2 teaspoon chives

1/8 teaspoon garlic powder

1/8 teaspoon paprika

Salt and pepper to taste

Directions

- 1. Preheat your oven to 350 degrees and grease a baking sheet or line it with parchment paper.
- 2. Dice up your onion and sauté it over low heat with your butter, stirring frequently. Cook until the onion has become slightly translucent, then let it cool.
- 3. In a large bowl, add the onion, chopped bread, cheese, eggs, flour, milk, and seasonings. Mix all of the ingredients thoroughly until it forms dough that is similar in texture to a meatball.
- 4. Form patties similar to small hamburgers with your dough and place them on your baking sheet. Bake for approximately 30 minutes, or until your patties are golden brown.
- 5. Heat broth, water, and seasonings in a pot on the stove.
- 6. Add your warm broth to a bowl and add one or two dumplings to it. Leave them to absorb some of the broth for a couple minutes before eating.

Thursday, January 19th is the last day for voters to file a petition with the town clerk to have an article appear on the ballot for Town Meeting. Petition must contain signatures from at least 5% of registered voters in the municipality.

Rt 22A Update

I met on December 14th with Bruce Martin of AOT (Roadway Design Project Manager) and two design engineers who are consulting with him on the Route 22A project. They have been working on some changes to the plan for the Benson segment, based on the feedback they received at the 502 hearing in June.

They reported that they have also met with the Agency of Natural Resources to map wetlands and coordinate any issues, in order to integrate that into the plan.

The new design includes changes to the intersection of Lake Rd and Rt 22A. They are currently looking at a left turning lane, a straight through lane, and a right turning lane, heading both north and south for this intersection. In addition, they are changing the layout of the intersection to bring Mill Pond Rd a little farther north, so that it aligns more directly across from Lake Rd, instead of the angle it is currently at. I told them I thought this would be well received news for both sides of town.

Based on feedback and a closer inspection of the G&L Store regarding gas pumps, parking issues, and the setback requirements, they have designed a larger curb on the corner of Route 144 and also moved the traveled roadway more towards the west. The additional space that would be provided by shifting the roadway and adding more pavement would provide much better mobility and more opportunity for turning movements for all vehicles. In addition, there would be a one-way entrance to the G&L from Route 144, instead of the way it is now (with cars able to enter and exit from all directions).

The current plan with these changes has now been sent out to review for 3 weeks for others around the Agency to comment on, regarding permitting aspects, constructability, etc. that may need some revising prior to meeting with property owners. Once the design is finalized, they will update the website with the new drawings, and then the next step is to begin property owner meetings in February/March.

Rescue Squad Request for Proposals

There have been a lot of rumors circulating about the board's request for proposals for ambulance/rescue squad services for the Town. Last year, voters approved \$52,185 in funding for Fair Haven Rescue Squad at Town Meeting. *The Town Purchasing Policy requires that any purchase exceeding \$5,000 needs to be put out for bid.* The Selectboard is merely doing their job, following the Purchasing Policy and managing the finances of the Town by seeking proposals. The Board feels that the decision to recommend a rescue squad needs to be based on a number of factors, including: cost, availability of services, proximity and familiarity with the Town, history of the service provider, and financial stability of the provider.
