



BENSON VILLAGE SCHOOL - Go BEARS!

Welcome, 2024! January rings in with our BEARS returning to school on the 2nd of the month. Girl Scouts, Cooking Club, a field trip for our 4-5-6 students to Billings Farm, and K- 6th-grade ice skating are all on the schedule. The second K - 6th STEAM Project week will occur in February with students creating Balanced Structures. Structures must have the elements of balance and artistic whimsy.

The foundational learning and development of our BVS students in grades K-6 is at the heart of everything we do. The incredible team of teachers; Laura Dailey Prek, Makayla Ackert, Kindergarten, Rachel Fowler, 1st, Hailey Godette 2nd/3rd, Suzanne Miller 4th (5th & 6th ELA) and Elizabeth Schuyler 5th/6th (4th math) provide structured and engaging lessons to bring education alive with their students. Lessons have purpose and allow students to express their thinking and share ideas, strategies, and interests. Some of the key elements for K - 6th are:

Reading and Writing: Early literacy skills are established, focusing on phonics, comprehension, and vocabulary building.

Mathematics: Basic numeracy skills are developed, including counting, addition, subtraction, and an introduction to more complex concepts.

Social Skills: Students learn to interact with peers and adults, developing skills such as cooperation, communication, and conflict resolution.

Emotional Regulation: Understanding and managing emotions becomes a crucial aspect of development.

Critical Thinking: Encouraging students to think critically, solve problems, and make decisions.

Curiosity and Exploration: Fostering a sense of curiosity to explore and learn about the world around them.

Science: Introduction to basic scientific concepts and inquiry skills.

Social Studies: Basic understanding of communities, cultures, and historical events

Citizenship: Promoting a sense of responsibility and awareness of community.

Our Special Educator/Interventionist, Amanda Eddy, and our Counselor, Laura Budde, work with students on individualized academic and/or social-emotional needs to provide a full circle of support.

Benson Village School continues to award both students and staff with PAWs certificates for demonstrating the positive character traits associated with our district-wide PBIS (https://www.pbis.org/). To date, 256 certificates have been written for students and staff.

The SVUVT budget work has been underway and a reminder that there is one budget for the entire district, not individual school budgets. You may obtain a copy of the Annual Report that will be available in early February on the Slate Valley website, BVS, or town clerk's office. BENSON READING GROUP

The Reading Group will meet at the library on Wednesday January 17, 2024 to discuss It All Comes Back to You by Beth Duke. Veronica "Ronni" Johnson, licensed practical nurse and aspiring writer, meets the captivating Violet in the assisted living facility where Violet requires no assistance, just lots of male attention. When she dies, she leaves Ronni a very generous bequest—only if Ronni completes a book about her life within one year. As she's drawn into the world of young Violet, Ronni is mesmerized by life in a simpler time. It's an irresistible journey filled with revelations, some of them about men Ronni knew as octogenarians at Fairfield Springs.

The Reading Group will meet at the library on Wednesday February 21, 2024 to discuss Horse by Geraldine Brooks. *Kentucky*, 1850. An enslaved groom named Jarret and a bay foal forge a bond of understanding that will carry the horse to record-setting victories across the South. When the nation erupts in civil war, an itinerant young artist who has made his name on paintings of the racehorse takes up arms for the Union. *New York City*, 1954. Martha Jackson, a gallery owner celebrated for taking risks on edgy contemporary painters, becomes obsessed with a nineteenth-century equestrian oil painting of mysterious provenance. *Washington*, *DC*, 2019. Jess, a Smithsonian scientist from Australia, and Theo, a Nigerian-American art historian, find themselves unexpectedly connected through their shared interest in the horse - one studying the stallion's bones for clues to his power and endurance, the other uncovering the lost history of the unsung Black horsemen who were critical to his racing success.

Copies of the books are available in the library. You are welcome to join us for an interesting discussion.

By vote of the Benson Selectboard, there will be a floor meeting held for Town Meeting 2024. Articles will be voted on the floor, in person, by registered voters of Benson.

Elections of Town Officers will be by Australian ballot with the polls open on March 5, 2024 from 10am to 7pm at the Benson Community Hall.

You may choose to request your ballot by phoning the Benson Town Clerk's office at 537-2611, or pick ballots up in person.

Voted ballots may be returned by mail, delivered in person to the Town Office (or to the polling place on Election Day), or left in the secure drop box located at the corner of the Town Office Building. Beginning on February 14th, you may also vote in person at the Town Clerk's Office during regular office hours.

HAPPY NEW YEAR!!!!

As we start this New Year, we would like to share some thoughts on our mission here in Slate Valley. Our first goal is to help to alleviate food insecurities within our local communities. Not only to offer food, but to do it with dignity. In the past year, Slate Valley Cares, previously known as Fair Haven Concerned, underwent significant transformations to better align with the communities we serve. We changed our name but also revamped our approach, focusing on creating an inclusive and dignified experience for our community members. This involved reimagining how we distribute food and redesigning our facility, which is now called the Right to Food Center, moving away from the term "food shelf".




One of the key changes made to our food distribution system was the creation of the Community Kiosk. This piece of infrastructure not only allows our community members to shop with greater dignity, mimicking that of a grocery store checkout, but also allows our store to function with fewer staff and volunteers. This simplification and streamlining have allowed us to expand our store hours, nearly tripling community access.

Our efforts have been widely recognized, garnering praise from esteemed organizations such as the Vermont Food Bank, as well as key political figures like Governor Phil Scott and Senator Peter Welch. Our innovative approach has

attracted interest from organizations across the state, prompting visits to our Right to Food Center to learn from our systems and methodologies. These changes have not only enhanced the visual appeal of our space but have also fostered a culture of openness and inclusivity within our organization, as well as increasing overall accessibility to our community. This shift is evident in the growing number of households and community members we serve. Over the past year, there has been a significant increase, with the number of households and individuals served per month more than doubling.
